2023 Cleveland High School Wrestling Team

“I’M NOT A QUITTER.”

In 1984, when Cleveland wrestling head coach **David Rosario** was a junior at Madera High School in Fresno, California, he won the state championship and was even bestowed the honor of running the torch relay at the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics. But surprisingly, Rosario considers his 3rd place state finish in his senior year to be his proudest accomplishment.

“I lost the first match and knew I had no chance at the championship. I went back to the hotel, had a shower, ate dinner, and fought my ego and disappointment so I could show up the next day,” said Rosario. “I went on to win five matches in a row for third place and decided I would never be a quitter. I bring that attitude forward in life and as a coach.”

After moving to Seattle, Rosario started his coaching career in 1992 at Cleveland. In 1996, he moved to Chief Sealth, building their wrestling program over the next 15 years. He returned to Cleveland in 2011 and has been a fixture at the school ever since, rebuilding the wrestling program that had been dropped for ten years.

Coach Rosario was named “Metro Coach of the Year” in 1999, 2001, 2008, 2010, and 2021 and “Referee Association Coach of the Year” in 2008. As one of the longest-tenured coaches in the league, his coaching peers regard him as one of, if not the best, coach in the league. Cleveland is beyond fortunate to have Rosario at the helm.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE.

Rosario is flanked by dedicated staff. **Dan Hamilton**, his assistant coach at Cleveland for the last six years, is also head coach of the cross-country team and an assistant coach for the track team. “Wrestling was a really formative activity for me growing up,” said Hamilton. “I loved the competition and physical nature of it and didn’t realize until later how meaningful and beneficial all the discipline, mental toughness, body control, and awareness would be for my life.” He added, “I had phenomenal wrestling coaches through my youth program and high school team who were key mentors for

me, so I want to pass that same experience along to our youth.”

The Cleveland wrestling program is also fortunate to have Rosario’s son, assistant coach Mitchell Torres on staff. Torres wrestled for Chief Sealth from 2002-2005, placing many times in both Metro and State, and has been coaching alongside Rosario at Cleveland since he took over the program in 2011. Rosario and Hamilton are also proud of “Coach Mom,” Rosario’s wife, who has lovingly prepared hundreds of homemade meals and snacks for wrestlers over the years. Cleveland wrestling is truly a family affair! Coach Rosario said, “We are also grateful to have several alumni come through the room this year to wrestle, mentor and share their experiences with Cleveland wrestlers.”

PERSEVERANCE AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Overall, wrestling experience on this year’s team is fairly low, with many first-time wrestlers. Twenty boys and three girl wrestlers practice daily in the Cleveland cafeteria after pushing tables and chairs aside after school and rolling out mats to practice. Afterward, mats are rolled back up, and tables and chairs are pushed back into place for the next school day. Nothing comes easy!

Wrapping up the dual season with a record of 7-7, we will send our top individual wrestler, **Elliot Kim**, to the Metro championships with an impressive record of 23-2. “Elliot’s hard work has really paid off,” said Rosario. Two other notable wrestlers are **Brandyn Truong** and **Derek Wade**. Both won at the Return of the Seahawk tournament in December and won individual titles at Cleveland’s own King of Beacon Hill invitational, held annually in January. “The prospects for Cleveland wrestling over the next few years look very promising,” added Hamilton.

NEEDS FOR GROWTH

“This year’s positive turnout was a good problem that left us scrambling for enough singlets and headgear for wrestlers,” said Hamilton. For the first time this winter, the team came together to fundraise, which paid for the new uniforms, tournament fees, and a few meals this season. Historically, with ever-shrinking athletic budgets, these costs are typically paid for by generous coaches and athletic directors since many families can’t afford to pay for athlete expenses.

Next year, we expect our wrestling turnout to grow, so additional uniforms and equipment will be needed. “Wrestling shoes are another big ticket item for new wrestlers, with many unable to afford them,” said Rosario. “We do pretty well at finding hand-me-downs from graduating wrestlers and used shoes from various sources, but we’re always on the lookout!” Another simple yet incrementally expensive need is for mat tape. “A couple of boxes of mat tape would allow us to tape the mats down in the cafeteria every day. Otherwise, we practice on sliding mats!” added Hamilton.

Ideally, the program would love to raise enough to send wrestlers to summer training camps. The best wrestlers in the state start training at a very young age, so helping to close that training gap would help build confidence and allow Cleveland to compete at the highest levels.

Lastly, we always need volunteer help for Cleveland’s annual **King of Beacon Hill Invitational**. Alumni interested in helping on a Saturday in January to work a scoreboard or keep time on one of the mats are always welcome!

Long before Cleveland's new girls' head basketball coach **Alfred Love, Jr.**, took over the program, he had already been putting his imprint on helping youth through the game of basketball. From the time he picked up his first clipboard in the 1980s, Coach Love, just like his name says, did what he loves to do as a basketball coach at Rainier Beach Community Center.

From his days at Rainier Beach Community Center, his journey would begin to branch off. In 1995, Love would spend two years as an assistant coach for the Chief Sealth girls' team before returning to South Seattle in 1997 to become an assistant coach at Rainier Beach High School. Then with experience at both the recreation and high school level, Love returned to coaching at the youth level in 2002.

When asked what made Love start coaching, his response was, "I realized I have a connection with the youth, I've been doing it for 30 years, and the time goes by fast when you're doing what you love."

For Love, the time went extremely fast, considering that he planned to stop coaching in 2008 after his players turned ten years old. However, fate and his willingness to make sure that the kids had an opportunity to develop their skills and play the game took over, and Love found himself back on the bench instilling lessons in teamwork, leadership, and sportsmanship.

"I was expecting the kids would advance to play with other coaches," said Love. "The previous girls' basketball coach at the community center didn't return, so the center asked if I would continue coaching the girls, to which I agreed."

One year later, in 2009, Love founded the SYRF basketball program, which stands for Seattle Youth Recreation Foundation. According to Love, the name is based on the following theory; Seattle is where we're from, Youth is the community served, Recreation is the type of program they have, and Foundation provides the base and beginning skills for youth wanting to learn basketball.

The genesis of the team was Love's desire to have his team travel and participate in tournaments outside of Seattle. But to do this, he needed to raise money, which was difficult for a community center team to do.

"In my first year of coaching the 10-year-old girls, we had a weekend off during Presidents Day," explained Love. "This is a normal break in the season, which I had forgotten about when I had my previous coaching stint, but I was frustrated because it felt like our team was the only one that wasn't traveling somewhere that weekend to play basketball."

Using that frustration as motivation, Love was determined to raise enough money to take his team to a tournament the following year. Going through the process of searching for travel funds without much luck, Love re-routed and found it beneficial to create a non-profit to help receive donations simply. With that in mind, he founded SYRF and received a grant from none other than Nike. In addition, he earned a grant from his job after being named the volunteer of the year.

After raising money for his team, Love took his first girls' basketball team to Portland in 2010 to play in a President's Day weekend tournament. Since then, the program has grown to include multiple teams for both boys and girls that allow them to enjoy travel and play basketball.

"For many of these kids, this is their first time traveling with a team," said Love. "We make things affordable for kids to have this experience, and it is not about the wins or losses. We have a lot of kids in our program who have gone on to play in high school and college as well."

Unlike many other traveling basketball programs across the

country, SYRF is affordable and allows all kids interested in participating.

"We don't have any tryouts for our teams, we don't make cuts or charge enormous fees like some AAU programs, and all of our coaches are volunteers," says Love. "We have a wonderful relationship with Seattle Parks and Recreation and Rainier Beach Community center, which has always been our home. Our program also offers basketball skill development classes in the fall and spring for youth and our basketball teams in the winter."

Having the ability to build a program from the ground up, Love was looking to do that yet again at the high school level and wanted to do so in South Seattle because that is where he has called home, **which ultimately landed him at Cleveland High School.**

In most cases, a team and coach's success are defined by wins and losses, but Love isn't abiding by that typical sports stereotype when it comes to his coaching or his team. Instead, he's found an alternate style of coaching and mantra, emphasizing players determine their own rules of success and do whatever it is that they find to be successful.

According to Love, basketball teams and programs will have good years and bad years, and while he is determined to build a successful program at Cleveland, he is equally focused on making sure his team is prepared for their next levels of life.

"We can win games or win a state title, but if I can't prepare you for college, I have failed," said Love. **"It's not just about playing sports at the next level; it's about having them prepared."**

With players like Cheyenne and Whitney Wilson, Jayde Christopher, Makala Roper, and Myzhanquie Ladd, who all helped put state title banners on the gym walls of the school, the Cleveland girls' basketball program was once a force to be reckoned with on both the local and national basketball landscapes. With Love looking to rebuild the program, he knows that the bar is set high, and reaching it will not happen overnight.

"I have to remind my girls that you have banners on the wall," said Love. **"It's more than just coaching for me; it's beyond the court we're looking for, and this is going to be a three-year plan."**

"We must dig down and get our foundation first, then build up," Love concluded.

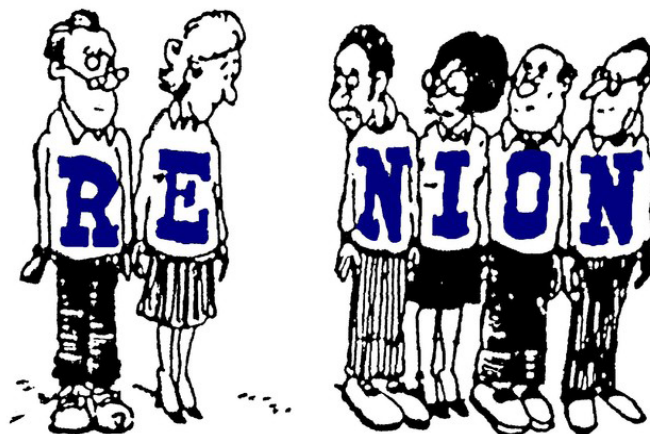

Every Friday preceding the Memorial Day weekend the CHS Alumni Association has a ceremony at the CHS Memorial Forest to honor alumni who lost their lives while serving in the US military.

What to Expect

Our ceremony typically includes guest speakers to tell stories about some of our alumni who have served in the armed forces of the USA. An Honor Guard fires a salute to our fallen heroes, and Bernie Moskowitz '57 plays Taps. CHS students participate in a flag-folding exercise before it is presented to a survivor of a fallen loved one.

The New Monument

Our new granite monument naming our fallen heroes was installed in 2017, thanks to a generous donation from two alumni who wish to remain anonymous. A protective coating was provided by Frank & Haru Nishimura. Frank served in the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, with good friend Yoshito Noritake who is listed on the monument.

Everyone is encouraged to make the trek to "The Rock."

The bronze plaques naming our fallen war heroes are no longer there, but it's good to see this special place in the forest where our heroes were honored for so many years.

Post-Ceremony Refreshments

Following the ceremony, refreshments are served to students, CHS staff, and guests. In some years, we have had four busloads of students but only one or two buses in most years. We are hopeful for a good turnout this year.

All expenses are paid by the CHS Alumni Association.

The maps below show our Memorial Forest is located between Issaquah and Fall City.

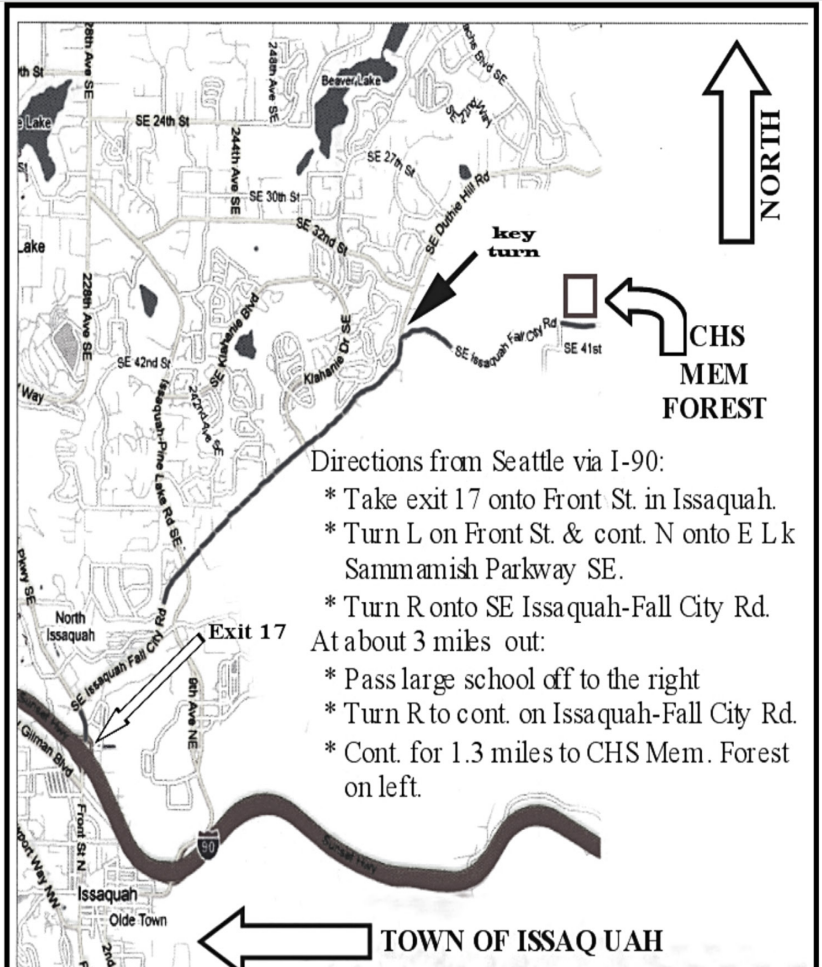
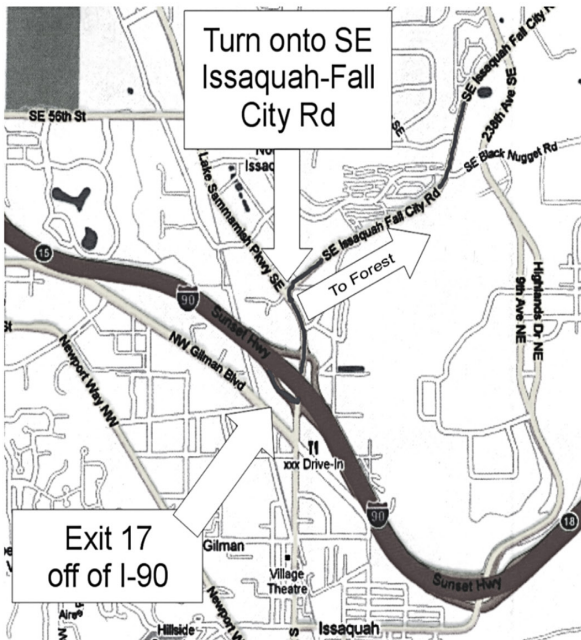

- * Follow SE Issaquah-Fall City Road to the Forest as shown on map at right.

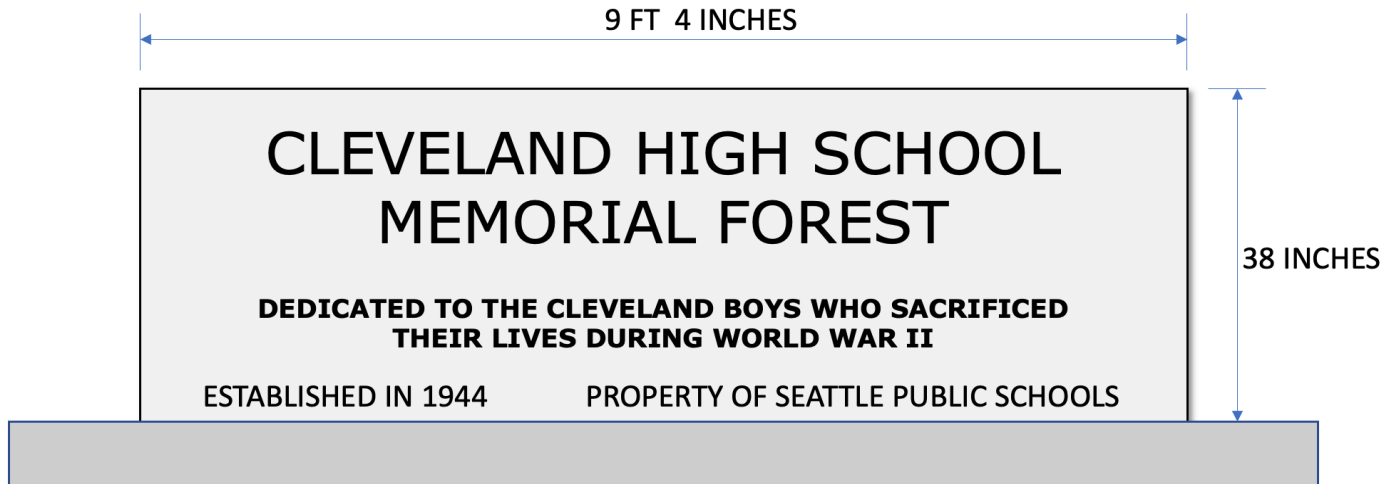




Concrete Sign Design Proposal

Seattle's Cleveland High School is the only high school in the universe with a memorial forest dedicated to alums who lost their lives during World War II.

This is our second re-design of the sign for the Cleveland High School Memorial Forest sign. We are struggling to achieve a design concept that is structurally sound and can be produced with reasonable costs. The estimated costs of the carved granite stone is **\$16,470**.

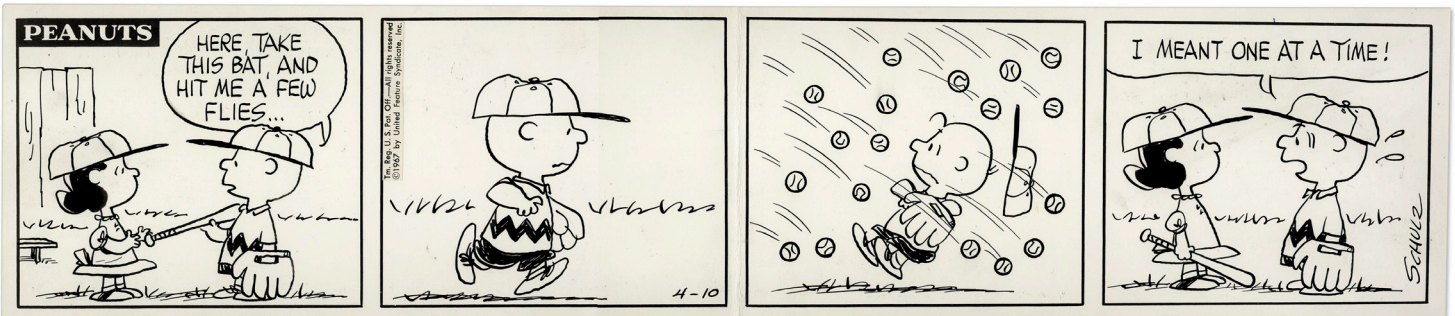


Carved granite stone on a concrete slab.

Our design features a carved granite stone sign on a granite slab. The granite slab measures 100 x 38 inches, with identical carving on both sides. Internal steel bars would extend vertically from the concrete slab into the granite to provide stability.

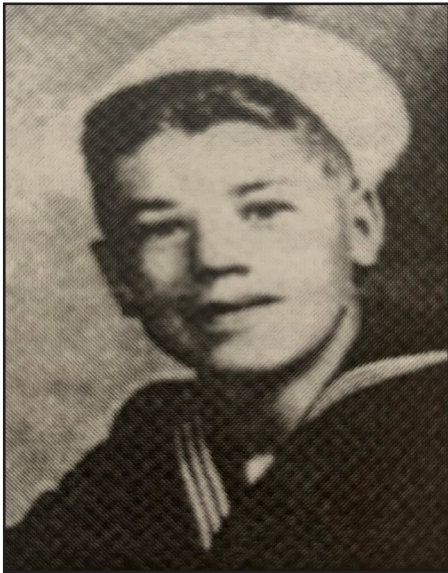

HONORED DEAD

Herbert Clayton "Toby" Holm
June 19, 1921 – March 1, 1942
USS *Houston*



Following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, the first few months of 1942 resulted in devastating losses to the United States and the Allies. Manila was taken in December, and by January 2 the Japanese controlled the Philippine Islands, as well as other islands and waterways in the western Pacific. British, Dutch, and Australian naval forces joined the United States Asiatic Fleet in a futile attempt to prevent further control of strategic areas necessary for shipping food and supplies, particularly oil, to Japan. The island of Java and the Sunda Strait were two vital possessions the Japanese sought to conquer, and conquer they did.

The story of the USS *Houston* is a story of the battle to retain Java and the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia). The *Houston* (CA30) was the second *Houston* to be built and named for Houston, Texas. It had been built in 1930, served as a flagship for admirals at earlier times, and had carried President Franklin Roosevelt on four different occasions. The *Houston* was the carrier flagship for the Asiatic Fleet at the beginning of the war.

From February 27 to March 1, 1943, the Battle of the Java and Sunda Strait

took place. These were hopeless battles, described as sacrificial, which allowed time for military leaders to prepare for future encounters. The American fleet, plus British, Australian and Dutch forces fought heroically, but by March 1 the *Houston* had been destroyed. Along with *Houston*, the American destroyer *Pope* and other Allied warships were lost. During these battles, Herbert Clayton Holm died.

Following the declaration of war, Toby was the first Cleveland High School student to be killed in battle.

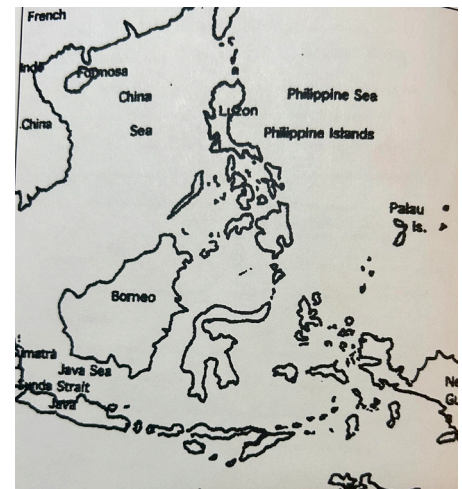
A memorial notice in the Seattle Post Intelligencer, dated March 18, 1942, gave a short history of Toby's life. He had been in South Dakota and was two when his family moved to Seattle. At the time of his death the family address was Rt. 8, Box 316A in the Georgetown district where he attended Georgetown Elementary School and Cleveland High School. As a young man Toby worked for Western Union, delivering messages from his bicycle. He enlisted in the Navy December 9, 1939, before completing high school. He was eighteen years old at that time.

At the time of his death Toby was a second-class fireman on the *Houston*. The family saw him for the last time in October, 1940. He was stationed in the Philippines after that visit, and his family did not hear from him after the attack on Pearl Harbor. In March, they received word he was missing. Toby was the youngest of seven children and the first to pass away. Notification of his death was heartbreaking for the family.

Toby was lost when torpedoes destroyed the ship. Seven hundred men, including the commanding officer, Captain A.H. Rooks, also from Seattle, died. Three hundred sixty-eight survivors were captured at Java, imprisoned and forced into slave labor. Many died of disease or injuries while in the prison camps.

Franklin Roosevelt loved the *Houston*. After its loss he went on the air to state, "We will build another *Houston*, and another *Houston*, and an-

other, until this war is won." Many moving stories of heroism and patriotism followed news of the *Houston's* destruction.* In Texas, a fund raiser to replace the cruiser resulted in the collection of enough money to produce a new battleship and at a war bond drive one thousand young men., "The *Houston* Avengers," joined the Navy. In the Holm family, Toby's sister, Mrs. Margaret Duffy, said, "If he had to go, we're proud he went like this." That sense of pride was to be reflected by many families as deaths mounted and the war continued.

After his military service, he returned to Seattle, where he graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. With his first wife and sons, he moved to Oregon, where he spent many years working in the paper, pulp, and steel industries.

During that time, he earned a Master's Degree in Business at the University of Portland.

In December of 1974, he met Marjorie on a blind date that his sister had arranged, and they married in the summer of the following year. With the love of his life, Marj, by his side, they lived a full and eventful life.

Life changed in 1980 when they started a two-year period in Germany and Saudi Arabia. They lived on an open site with fifty nationalities. George worked with a joint venture in building a steel mill in Gibail on the Persian Gulf. When he returned home, he had a renewed appreciation and love for being born in this country. The time spent abroad taught him and others how fortunate they were to be Americans.
